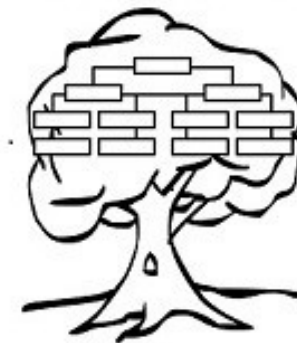

The Summer Before The War: 1860 Census Records

- Jacob Mauk, almost 70 and now a widower, lived in Perry, Jefferson county with his youngest daughter, Eve who was 21.
- John Ulry & Catherine (Mauk) Lingenfelter, both aged 44, lived in Perry, Jefferson county with seven of their children: Jacob (age 17), Margaret (14), Elizabeth (12), Ellen (11), Henrietta (7), John (5) and Jane (2).
 - Zachariah Lingenfelter, age 24, lived in West Mahoning, Indiana county with his wife, Mary (25), and their two children: Ann (4) and John (4 months).
 - Anna Lingenfelter, age 24, lived in Young, Jefferson county with her husband, Alexander Mundorff (32) and their two children: John (4) and Henry W. (2). Also living with them was Sarah Henry, age 16.
 - Susan Lingenfelter, age 23, also lived in Young with her husband, Peter Hetrick (32) and their three daughters: Anna L. (6), Florence C. (3) and Sarah E. (1).
 - William Lingenfelter, age 20, has not been located in the 1860 census.
- Henry Mauk, age 43, lived in Perry with his wife, Elizabeth (Knarr) (40), and their children: Isaac (18), Mary (15) and John (1).
- John and Rachel (Clark) Mauk, both aged 42, lived in Oliver, Jefferson county with seven of their children: Jacob (19), William (17), John (14), Alexander (7), Charlotte Jane (5), Margaret (3) and Amos (1).
- Sarah Mauk, age 45, lived in Perry, with her husband, David Smith (49) and nine of their children: Mary Ann (18), Samuel (16), David (14), Susannah (15), John (12), Henry (9), James (6), Thomas (4) and Samuel W. (3 months).
- Samuel Mauk, age 40, also lived in Perry with his wife, Margaret (Lingenfelter) (38), and six of their children: George (18), Jacob C. (15), Abraham (14), Thomas (12), Elizabeth (11) and John (2).
- Joseph Mauk, age 38, lived in Canoe, Indiana county with his wife Mary (Hoover) (36) and five of their children: Nancy E. (9), Levina C. (7), Dallas N. (6), Sarah B. (4) and Susanna (1). Joseph's two sons from his first marriage to Nancy Hoover also lived with them: Albert (13) and Fredrick E. (11).
- Susan Mauk, age 26, lived in Clover, Jefferson county with her husband, Hiram Carrier (age 33) and three of their children: Mary E. (5), Merinda H. (3) and Isaac A. (1).

The Summer Before The War: 1860 Census Records (cont.)

•Mary 'Polly' Mauk, age 37, lived in McCalmont, Jefferson county with her husband Thomas Hopkins (age 53) and ten of their children: John (19), Susannah (17), Jane (15), Robert (14), Jacob (12), James (10), Mary (8), Eliza (7), Sarah Ann (5) and Aaron (2). H. Benjamin McCann, a 23 year old farm laborer, also lived with the family.

•Isaac Mauk, age 35, lived in Oliver, Jefferson county with his wife Catherine Raybuck (age 34) and six of their children: Mary Ann (12), Daniel (Beniel) M. (9), Margaret (6), Isaac (5), Susannah (2) and Charlotte (4 months). Their son John had died at age ten, less than three months before the census was taken.

•Jacob Mauk, age 33, lived in Indiana, Pennsylvania with his wife, Elizabeth McElhoes (age 30) and three of their children: Thomas S. M. (3), Samuel A. (2) and James G. (8 months). Martha Heron, 18 year old housekeeper, also lived with them.

•Elizabeth Mauk, age 42, lived in Rose, Jefferson county with her husband William Thompson. Five children are listed with them in the 1860 census. The oldest is McClain Thompson, age 13. McClain is also listed in that census with Thomas and Barbara (Mauk) Reed. McClain was born before Elizabeth & William married and so he is probably William's son from an earlier marriage. The next child listed with this family is Mary Jane Mock, also age 13. She was also with the family in 1850 and was listed as Mary J. Thompson. It is not known who her parents were. The other three were children of Elizabeth & William: Ockran A. (age 7), Arba A. (5) and E. Brown (1).

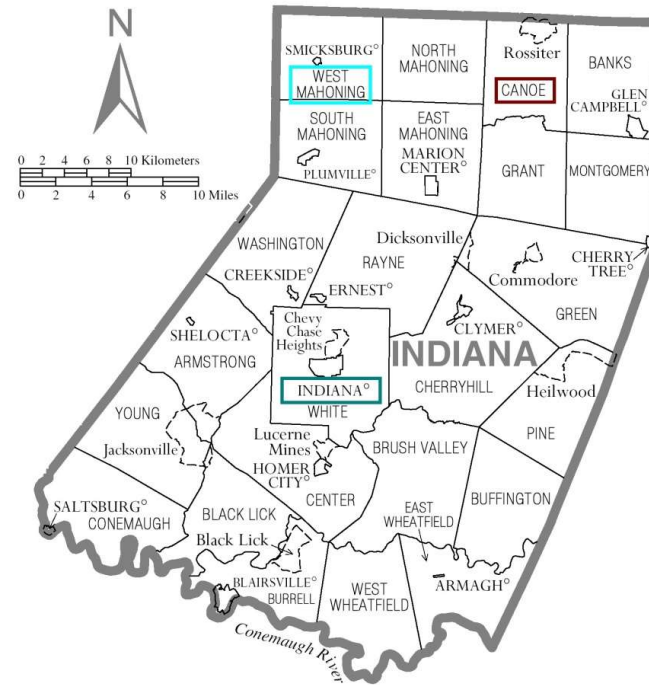
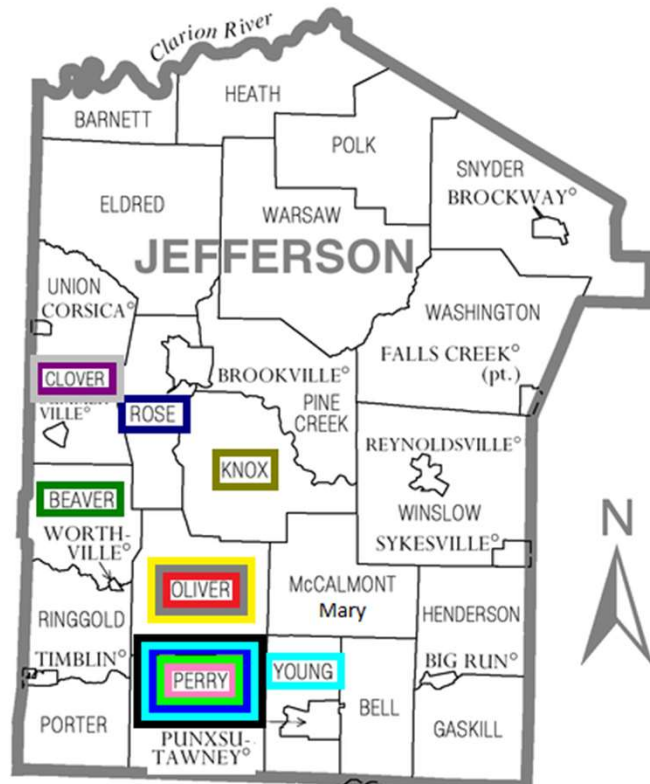
•Alexander Mauk, age 30, lived in Knox, Jefferson county with his wife Rebecca Nolph (age 25) and three of their children: Sarah (5), Susannah (4) and Mary (2).

•Dorthea Mauk had passed away in December 1855. Her husband, Jacob Wagner (age 29) lived in Beaver, Jefferson county with his second wife, Rebecca Haines (age 26) and their one year old son, Calvin W. Jacob & Dorthea's daughter, Catherine, age 7, also lived with them.

•Barbara Mauk, age 24, lived in Oliver, Jefferson county with her husband, Thomas Reed (age 26) and three of their children: Evanah (3), Charlotte (2) and Mirnerva (6 months). "McCan" Thompson age 13, is also listed with them.

•Rachel Mauk, age 22, lived in Clover, Jefferson county with her husband, Bryan A. Wesson (age 23) and three of their children: Ursula Viola (3), Almiron M. (2) and Mary L. C. (1). Two other people are also listed with the family: Sarah J. Blyler, age 12, and Samuel B. Taylor, age 58. Their connection to the family is not known. Samuel was a laborer.

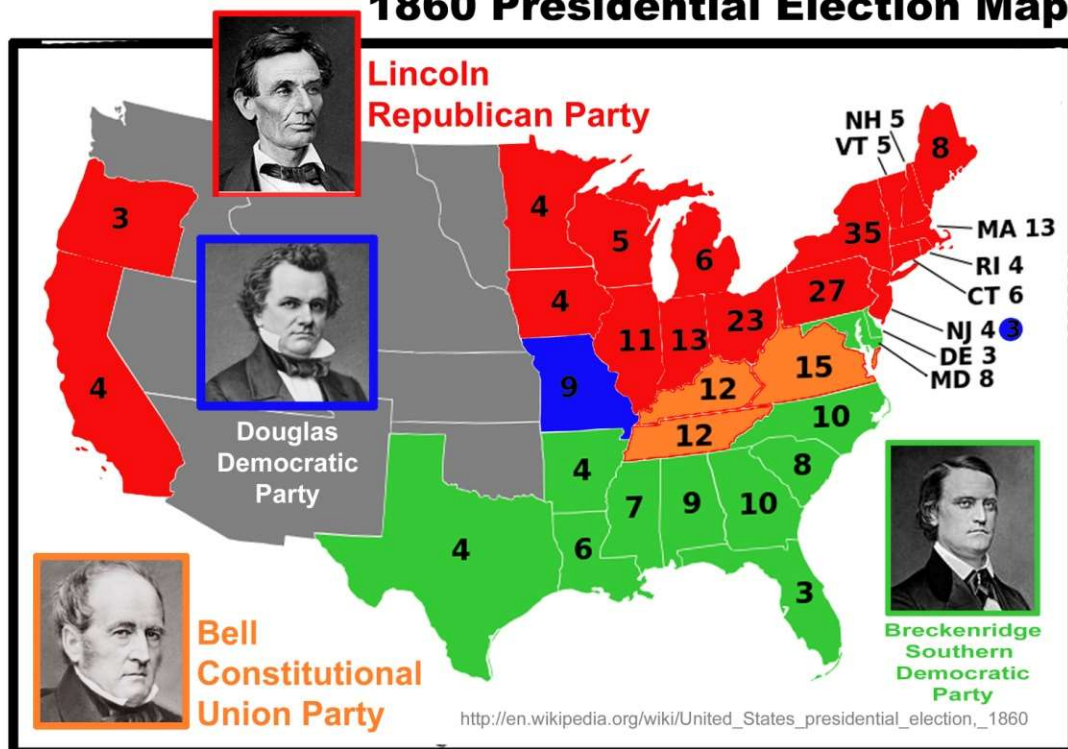

Indiana County Post Offices: Indiana (Indiana), Marchand (Canoe), Smicksburg (West Mahoning).

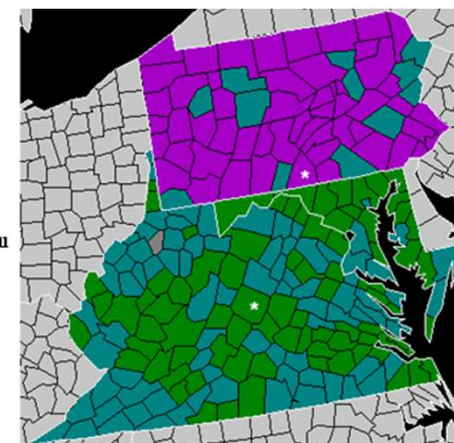
The Election of 1860

1860 Presidential Election

- Republican: Abraham Lincoln
- Democrat: Stephen Douglas & John C. Breckinridge
- Constitutional Union: John Bell



Four candidates received electoral votes in the 1860 presidential election. All adult white men were able to vote. The vote split along geographical lines and plunged the country into civil war the following year.

A majority of voters in Jefferson and Indiana counties voted for Abraham Lincoln.

Catherine Line

John U. & Catherine Lingenfelter

- John & Catherine's youngest child, Mary Jane, was born in April 1861. There were now 8 children at home. Four adult children had begun lives of their own.
- Ella Margaret married Daniel Updegraff in 1862, she was about 17.
- Catherine died on May 8, 1863. She was the eldest of Jacob & Susannah's children and the first of their adult children to die. She was 47 years old. She left John with seven children, aged 2 through 19. She also left eleven grandchildren

Zacharius & Anna Lingenfelter

- Zacharius & Anna's third child, William Martin, was born on April 12, 1861.
- Their fourth child, Imelda Jane, was born almost exactly two years later on April 5, 1863
- Their fifth child, Susan M. arrived almost exactly two years later on April 10, 1865.

Alexander H. & Ann S. Mundorff

- Alexander & Ann's younger son, Charles, died on December 2, 1862. He was two years old.
- A son, William Henry Mundorff, was born on April 22, 1863.
- A daughter, Ann Lizzie, was born on June 1, 1863. (Note: William's and Ann's birthdates are taken from their death certificates. Census records corroborate Ann's 1863 birth date but indicate William was born 4 to 5 years earlier.)
- Their youngest child, Emma Jane, was born in 1865

Peter & Susannah Hetrick

- Peter & Susannah's first son, Benjamin Franklin, was born on November 23, 1860.
- Their fourth daughter and fifth child, Mary Ella, was born on September 28, 1863.
- Their fifth daughter, Laura Jane, was born on August 17, 1864.

Catherine Line



William Johnson Lingenfelter

- Mr. Lingenfelter enlisted as a Union soldier in Company C, Two hundred and Sixth Pennsylvania Infantry in which he served about six months as a private. When leaving the army he again went into a store and was thus occupied until January, 1865. Then going to Tennessee he rented a large plantation and raised a crop of cotton and corn. His employers at the store had solicited him to go there, they furnishing all the money necessary and giving him one-third of the profits. Each partner each realized about \$800. Mr. Lingenfelter returned to Pennsylvania in December, 1865 and in March following emigrated to Missouri and purchased a farm in Gentry County. Jacob B. Lingenfelter

- Jacob joined the army in Indiana, PA on August 25, 1864, enlisting for one year. He was mustered into Co. B, 206th Penn. Vols. On August 31st at Pittsburgh. His service ended in June 1865.



John Kinter

- On August 7, 1862, the day after he reached the age of twenty-one, he enlisted in Co. I, 135th Regiment, Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry, which was assigned to the 1st Brigade, 3rd Division, 1st Army Corps. In 1862 the Regiment did guard duty and patrol service at Washington, D. C. and Mr. Kinter saw service at the battles of Chancellorsville and Fredericksburg. He was discharged in May, 1863 and again entered the service in March, 1865, this time joining Co. F, 74th Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry, as first lieutenant, and was subsequently promoted to captain, serving with that rank until discharged August 29, 1865. He was one of the scouting party that went after Mosby. During his first enlistment he had served as drum major and at the time of his death still was in possession of the drum he carried. (From his obituary.)
- John Kinter married Elizabeth Lingenfelter on May 21, 1868.

Henry Line

Henry & Elizabeth Mauk

- Henry died on July 28, 1864 at the age of 47. He was Jacob & Susannah's eldest son and oldest surviving child in 1864. Henry left his pregnant wife Elizabeth (Knarr) with three children, aged 5 to 22.
- Henry & Elizabeth's oldest and only surviving daughter, Mary Ellen, married John Bittenbender Mohny on September 8, 1864.
- Henry & Elizabeth's youngest son, William Franklin, was born on September 22, 1864. William died on April 23, 1865.



Isaac Mauk

- Isaac, age 20, enlisted in the army for 90 days at Jefferson county on June 30, 1863. He was mustered in to Co. H, 57th Penn. Militia at Pittsburgh on July 7th. He was mustered out on August 17, 1863.

John B. & Mary E. Mohny

- John Bittenbender Mohny married Mary Ellen Mauk on September 8, 1864.
- Their first child was a daughter, Sarah Elizabeth, born on April 18, 1865.

John Line



Jacob Mauk

- On November 22, 1861, Jacob Mauk, age 19, joined the army in Brookville. He volunteered for 3 years. He was mustered into service on December 31, 1861 in Alexandria, Virginia and was in the 105th Pennsylvania Infantry, Company I. He died on November 13, 1862 and is buried in Virginia. His name is listed as Jacob J. Mauk. John & Rachel's oldest son is the only Jacob in the tribal page who was the right age, but the tribal page also lists him as the father of Floranda Mauk who was born after the war so this identification is in doubt.



William Mauk

- John & Rachel Mauk's 2nd oldest son, William, was among those drafted in Jefferson county on March 7, 1865. These draftees were all discharged on April 14, 1865. General Lee had surrendered on April 9th.

Sarah Line

David & Sarah Smith

- Mary Ann Smith, David & Sarah's first daughter and oldest surviving child, married Joseph Reed on March 20, 1860.
- Rosetta Alice Smith, their youngest daughter, was born on September 10, 1862.
- Samuel William Smith, their oldest surviving son, married Mary Condron in 1863.
- David R. Smith died on May 12, 1864 at Spotsylvania.
- Mary Ann Smith died in March 1864.
- Susannah M. Smith, David & Sarah's second daughter, married Boaz Blose on August 23, 1864.
- David Smith was born in 1865 and was presumably named for his older brother who had been killed in the war,

Sarah Line



Joseph & Mary Ann Reed

- Mary Ann Smith married Joseph Reed on March 20, 1860 in Coolspring.
- Their first daughter, Sarah Elizabeth, was born on May 27, 1861.
- Their second daughter, Olivea Johanna Josephine, was born almost exactly one year later on May 26, 1862.
- Mary Ann died in March 1864.
- Joseph Reed served a three year enlistment in the Civil War-105th PA Volunteer Infantry, was home for two weeks and re-enlisted. He served but a few weeks of his second enlistment when he was killed in the Siege of Petersburg, City Point, Virginia. His wife died a few months before him. leaving the two daughters to be raised by their grandparents David and Sara Smith. (Source: Mauk tribal page.)



Boaz & Susannah Blose

- Boaz “Enlisted in Company A, Pennsylvania 105th Infantry Regiment on 09 Sep 1861. Mustered out on 30 Jan 1863.” (Source: Ancestry.com) According to the Mauk tribal page he received a disability discharge.
- Susannah M . Smith married Boaz Devos Blose on August 23, 1864.
- Boaz “Enlisted in Company B, Pennsylvania 206th Infantry Regiment on 31 Aug 1864. Mustered out on 26 Jun 1865 at Richmond, VA.” (Source: Ancestry.com)

Sarah Line

Samuel & Mary Smith

- Samuel William Smith married Mary Ellen Condron in 1863.
- Their first child, Sherman Weston, was born on August 23, 1864.



David B. Smith

- David & Sarah's 6th child, David, enlisted in the army in Brookville on Aug. 7, 1862 at the age of 18, though earlier census records indicate he was younger. He was mustered into service at Harrisburg, PA on Sept. 2, 1862 in Co. E of the 148th Penns. Vols.
- Chancellorsville, Gettysburg and the Wilderness were among the 148th's battles.
- David was killed during the battle of Po River in May 1864

Samuel Line

Samuel & Margaret Mauk

- Samuel & Margaret's 13th child, Andrew Lincoln, was born on January 29, 1861.
- Another son, Zacharius, was born on February 22, 1863. He died the same day.
- About a year later on February 7, 1864, another son was born. He was named Joseph N. He died November 1, 1864. He was the eighth child of theirs to die young.
- Their son, George, married Susannah Matter in 1864.



George & Susannah Mauk

- George, age 20, enlisted in the army for 90 days at Jefferson county on June 30, 1863. He was mustered in to Co. H, 57th Penn. Militia at Pittsburgh on July 7th. He was mustered out on August 17, 1863.
- George married Susannah Matter in 1864.



Jacob Mauk

- Jacob, age 19, enlisted in the army for 90 days at Jefferson county on July 21, 1863. He was mustered in to Co. H, 57th Penn. Militia at Pittsburgh on July 7th. He was mustered out on August 17, 1863.

Joseph & Mary Mauk

- Joseph & Mary's 6th child, Laura Jane, was born on March 13, 1861.
- Their 7th child, Jacob Grant, was born almost exactly two years later on March 18, 1863.
- Joseph "Enlisted in Company C, Pennsylvania 206th Infantry Regiment on 26 Aug 1864. Mustered out on 26 Jun 1865 at Richmond, VA." (Source: Ancestry.com) His service ended in June 1865.

Mary 'Polly' Line

Benjamin & Susanna McCann

- Susanna Hopkins, eldest daughter of Thomas & Mary 'Polly' Hopkins, married Benjamin Franklin McCann on July 24, 1861.
- Their 1st child, Thomas Wilson, was born March 28, 1864.
- Their 2nd child, Mary Emma, was born on July 27, 1865.

Isaac Line

Isaac & Catherine Mauk

- Isaac & Catherine's 7th child, Elizabeth C., was born on April 10, 1863.
- Their 8th child, Washington Lyman, was born on October 16, 1864.

Jacob Line

Jacob & Elizabeth Mauk

- Jacob & Elizabeth's 4th child and oldest daughter, Anna Dora, was born on October 21, 1861.
- Their 5th child, Jacob Lee, was born on June 8, 1863.
- Their son, James Green, died on September 1, 1863 at age 3.
- Jacob Lee died on October 30, 1864.
- Twins were born to the couple on November 23, 1865, but only one, named John Sutton, survived.

Elizabeth Line

William & Elizabeth Thompson

- William & Elizabeth's son, John B., was born on January 22, 1860.
- Their son, Numenius Brown, died on September 19, 1860. He was about two years old.
- Their son, Arba A., died soon after on October 7, 1860.
- Their daughter, Araminta L., was born on April 8, 1863.
- Their son, Hugh Edward, was born on Dec. 29, 1865.



McClain Thompson

- "Enlisted in Company B, Pennsylvania 78th Infantry Regiment on 31 Mar 1864. Mustered out on 11 Sep 1865 at Nashville, TN." (Source: Ancestry.com)

Alexander & Rebecca Mauk

- Alexander & Rebecca's 4th child and 1st son, Martin Henry, was born on July 15, 1861.
- Alexander, age 36, enlisted in the army for 90 days at Jefferson county on June 30, 1863. He was mustered in to Co. H, 57th Penn. Militia at Pittsburgh on July 7th. He was mustered out on August 17, 1863.
- Their 5th child, Elizabeth Amelda, was born on March 18, 1864.

Dorthea Line

Jacob & Rebecca Wagner

- Jacob & Dorthea's only surviving child, Catherine Ethel, lived with her father and step-mother.

Susanna Line



Hiram & Susanna Carrier

- Hiram & Susanna's 4th child, Charles E., was born on October 5, 1860.
- Hiram was among those drafted in Jefferson county on March 7, 1865. These draftees were all discharged on April 14, 1865. General Lee had surrendered on April 9th.
- Their 5th child, Marcella Jane, was born on Jan. 17, 1863.
- Their 6th child, William Hull, was born on March 13,

Barbara Line



Thomas & Barbara Reed

- Thomas & Barbara's 3rd child, Elmer Jacob, was born on November 13, 1861.
- During the Civil War he enlisted in the 82nd Pennsylvania Regiment and served for one year and 11 months. (Source: His obituary.)
- Their 4th child, Marcella, was born on Feb. 28, 1864.
- Their 5th child, Violet Hulda, was born on Dec. 4, 1865.

Rachel Line



Bryan & Rachel Wesson

- Bryan & Rachel's 4th child, Lucy Alverson, was born on April 22, 1861,
- Their 5th child, Dwight Daly, was born on June 30, 1862.
- Bryan was drafted on August 26, 1863. He paid \$300 to be exempt from service.
- Their 6th child, Laura Ophelia, was born on May 2, 1864.

Eve Line

John U. & Eve Lingenfelter

- Eve Ann Mauk married her oldest sister's widower, John Ulry Lingenfelter, on January 19, 1864.
- Their first child, Andrew Harrison, was born on August 24, 1864.
- Their second child, Benjamin Franklin, was born on August 6, 1865.

Those Who Served

105th Pennsylvania Volunteers (*Williamsburg, Seven Pines, Glendale, Malvern Hill, Chancellorsville, Gettysburg, Wilderness Spotsylvania Courthouse*)



Joseph Reed: Mustered into Company G on August 28, 1861. Killed in action at Petersburg, Va. on June 16, 1864. Buried at City Point, Va.



Boaz Blose: Enlisted in Company C on September 9, 1861. Was discharged on Surgeon's Certificate on January 30, 1863.



Jacob Mauk: Enlisted in Brookville and mustered into Company I on December 31, 1861 at Alexandria, Va. Died November 13, 1862 and is buried at the Military Asylum Cemetery in Wash., D.C.

135th Pennsylvania Volunteers (*Provost duty at Washington & Georgetown, Chancellorsville*)



John Kinter: Enlisted in Indiana County and was mustered in as corporal in Company I at Harrisburg on August 15, 1862. He was mustered out on May 24, 1863.

148th Pennsylvania Volunteers (*Chancellorsville, Gettysburg, Wilderness, Spotsylvania*)



David Smith: 148th Penn. Vols., Co. E. Mustered in Sept. 2, 1862. Wounded at Gettysburg. Killed near Spotsylvania, Va., May 12, 1864.

57th Pennsylvania Militia (*Guarded fords on the Ohio River during Morgan's Raid.*)

82nd Pennsylvania Volunteers (*Spotsylvania, North Anna River, Cold Harbor, Petersburg, Opequan, Winchester, Fisher's Hill, Cedar Creek, Appomattox Campaign.*)



Thomas Reed: Drafted into Company K on Aug. 29, 1863. Transferred to Company B on September 4, 1864. Mustered out at Hall's Hill, Va. On July 13, 1865.

78th Pennsylvania Volunteers (*Atlanta Campaign, Resaca, Nashville*)



McClain Thompson: Enlisted in Brookville and mustered into Company B at Carlisle on March 31, 1864. He was on furlough when the company was mustered out on September 11, 1865.

206th Pennsylvania Volunteers (Fatigue duty at Dutch Gap, Va., *Duty in the trenches before Richmond, Occupation of Richmond.*)



Joseph Mauk: Mustered into Company C on August 26, 1864. Mustered out on June 26, 1865 at Richmond, Va.



Boaz Blose: Re-enlisted and was mustered into Company B on August 31, 1864 at Pittsburgh. Mustered out on June 26, 1865 at Richmond, Va..



Jacob Lingenfelter: Mustered into Company B on August 31, 1864 at Pittsburgh. Mustered out on June 26, 1865 at Richmond, Va.

74th Pennsylvania Volunteers (*Guarded Parkersburg branch of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad.*)



John Kinter: Re-enlisted and was mustered in as 1st Lt. in Company F at Harrisburg on March 11, 1865. He was promoted to Captain on July 29, 1865 and mustered out on August 29, 1865.

Drafted on March 7, 1865 and discharged on April 14, 1865
